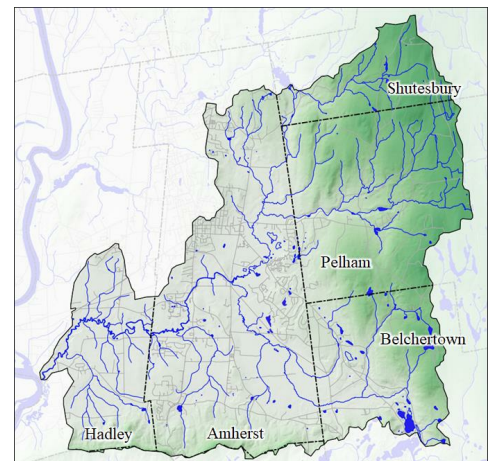

## #FortRiverFacts

The Fort River is the longest tributary of the Connecticut River - and in Massachusetts! - with free passage for fish and other species. Our community impacts the health of the river and the species living in it. It's a biological treasure in our backyards and we're excited to celebrate it!

The Fort River feeds the drinking water supply for Amherst through two reservoirs in Shutesbury and Pelham. The Fort River watershed (the river and the land that drains in to it) run through parts of Amherst, Shutesbury, Pelham, Belchertown and Hadley.

**Map of the Fort River watershed**

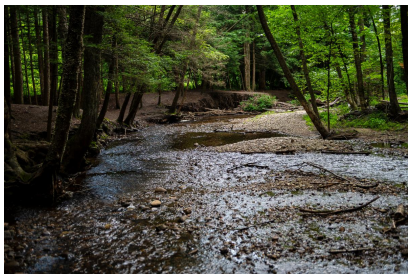


The Fort River is home to several species of freshwater mussel, including one species federally listed as being endangered - the dwarf wedgemussel. Mussels are extremely sensitive to pollution and degraded water quality.
